Brokers are stock market experts who use their market knowledge to assist clients and facilitate transactions. Other than brokerage, there are several other lucrative opportunities for professionals in stock trading. Some popular avenues include data analytics, consultancy, research and portfolio management services. The skills, qualifications and on-the-job training required for these job roles vary greatly.

For instance, research professionals gather and compile information to generate inferences and observations, while analysts interpret stock market data and generate useful insights relating to market performance and risk. On the other hand, administrative professionals manage hedge funds and mutual funds and execute financial strategies to improve the performance of client portfolios. Professionals in consultant roles may interact regularly with clients and other professionals to help them stay up-to-date on major developments and opportunities in the industry.

Top 10 careers in stock market

Consider these job roles if you are interested in starting a career in the stock market:

1. Market research analyst

Primary duties: Companies require market research analysts to collect and compile consumer and competitor data. Analysts interpret this data to provide useful insights to their companies or clients. In the stock market, a research analyst may research the performance history of a company or its stock to help a buyer make an investment decision.

They may also perform research to help companies with business processes like expansion and IPOs (Initial Public Offerings). Equity and stock often behave like products or commodities, whose performance is affected by demand and supply factors. Market research analysts use their expertise to study these market forces and develop curated investment portfolios and financial strategies to navigate a market at any given point of time.

2. Dealer

Primary duties: Dealers buy, hold and sell shares and equity on a stock exchange. They try to procure stock prior to a demand surge and sell it to interested buyers at higher prices to turn a profit. A dealer makes trades on their own account and for their own financial benefit. A broker on the other hand only facilitates such trades to receive a commission. The difference between dealers and traders is that a dealer operates as a business and usually has a larger scale of operations.

For example, a trader may purchase 100 shares of a stock and sell them all for a small profit, which they may invest further or withdraw. A dealer, on the other hand, procures a significantly larger amount of the stock (for instance, 10,000 shares) and conducts transactions with multiple traders and buyers to generate a much larger profit. A major portion of this profit may go into further investment and procurement of equity.

3. Trader

Primary duties: In the stock market, traders are individuals who purchase and sell equities and shares regularly for financial gains. They strategise and identify entry and exit points for share values and make the necessary transactions to maximise profits. They try to reap financial rewards from short-term market fluctuations, and this makes their practice different from that of investors. Investors tend to have larger starting capital than traders and usually follow long-term financial strategies to maximise their profits. Trading has huge earning potential but involves a considerable amount of risk.

4. Investment consultant

Primary duties: Investment consultants use their knowledge of equity and market trends to help their clients make good investment decisions. Investors may expect short-term or long-term financial gains, depending on their investment strategy. Investment consultants understand the specific financial goals of their clients and share valuable information regarding stock prices, stock performance, company reputation and performance history. They help investors develop a better understanding of their financial situation and the consequences of their decisions. They may work independently, or with financial institutions like banks, to assess the investment plans of clients.

5. Financial analyst

Primary duties: Financial analysts are professionals who collect, organise and interpret financial data to provide forecasts, track metrics and create simulations or financial models. Companies often require the help of analysts to make consequential financial decisions. Analysts provide insights and inferences to help their clients get a comprehensive understanding of market scenarios before making large investments. Professionals in this domain may work independently or as part of the regular staff of a company.

6. Fundamental analyst

Primary duties: Fundamental analysts are professionals who perform holistic research on a company, a stock, or a market to find the inherent value or risks associated with financial decisions and transactions. They may analyse a range of factors and indicators to generate these insights, including financial health, growth potential, overall capital, return on equity and profit margins.

7. Risk analyst

Primary duties: Risk analysts help companies and clients assess the financial and temporal costs associated with major business decisions. On behalf of companies, they study market trends and perform investigations on clients and their financial records to evaluate risks involved in doing business with them. In the stock market, their expertise is often required in scenarios where companies or investors want to make major changes to their portfolios or holdings. Risk analysts try to paint an objective picture, weighing the pros and cons of a business situation in detail before giving advice.

8. Equity analyst

Primary duties: Equity analysts assess a company or stock's performance history and analyse market trends to predict its performance for future periods. They use their specialised knowledge and understanding of finance to help clients make informed decisions relating to transactions and investments. They may also periodically track indicators to monitor the performance of stocks that their companies or clients hold. This job role involves heavy research and requires advanced analytical skills and business intelligence, along with financial and legal literacy.

9. Investment banker

Primary duties: Investment banking is a subset of banking operations that enables companies or individual investors to raise money and resources for business activities and increase capital. Professionals in this domain are experts in economics and finance and devise methods and strategies to help clients meet their financial goals. They may act as a consultant and provide advice, or may even stand in as an intermediary to facilitate transactions following a systematic pre-determined strategy.

10. Technical analyst

Primary duties: A technical analyst is a professional statistician who evaluates investment decisions by studying market data and technical indicators. They try to understand market behaviour and price movements using raw data and assume an advisory role to their clients at times. The technical indicators they use are tools related to methodologies involved in studying different aspects of a market or stock, like volatility, strength, demand and potential. Prominent indicators include Bollinger Bands, MACD (Moving Average Convergence Divergence), MFI (Money Flow Index) and RSI (Relative Strength Index).

Trade refers to buying and selling goods to gain money. Trading not only earns you money but also serves the purpose of providing services to various consumers. Trading plays an important role in the global economy by creating liquidity in the financial market

. Trading is the chief source of profits for investment banks, and it is also done by many other institutions like hedge funds

, commodities companies, etc. Trading, generally, uses scientific methods and extensive research to predict the future of the financial market.

Types of Trading

There are three major ways in which trading can be done:

#1 - Market Making

Market making is when a trader buys a product or asset from a buyer and then sells the product to a seller at high prices, thus making his profit in the deal. This gain in profit is called market making. To be a good market maker

, you must observe the market closely and complete both sides of the deal before the asset price goes up or dips down.

#2 – Agency Trading

In agency trading, you perform trading for your client. An agency trader has a list of clients who contact him for buying assets at a specified amount, and the agency trader executes the request. Agency trading involves many restrictions as compared to other ways of trading.

#3 – Proprietary Trading

Proprietary trading

is the riskiest of all types of trading, but it is also the most profitable way of trading. Prop traders work according to the theories and assumptions about the working of the market and open positions according to it. If they are correct, they make a large amount of money; otherwise, they lose it. Most investment banks have dedicated desks for prop trading, and we even have many firms dedicated to propping trading.

Generally, traders look for large short-term gains, and Equities do not provide such opportunities.

#2 – Fixed Income Trader

Trade on bonds, government securities, and fixed-income assets

Fixed Income Asset means any assets that provide fixed returns over some time.

These can be further subdivided into Government, Mortgage, Municipal, Corporate, etc. Fixed Income trading tends to be riskier than Equities as Fixed income has been extended to exotic instruments like CDO (Collateralized debt

obligations). CDOs were the main reason for the 2008 crisis.

#3 – Forex Trader

Appreciation Potential.

Careers in Trading – Pre-Requisites

To make a career in trading, the first and foremost step is to get a degree from a reputed university and, after that, pursue an internship at any commercial bank or hedge fund to get the nittygritty of the trade and have hands-on experience. Being a graduate is sufficient for getting a trading job, but with the growing competition, you will be a much-preferred candidate with financial degrees like CPA, CFA

, and MBA. Since trading is all about math and statistics, candidates who have done postgraduate or doctorate in mathematical and statistical fields. In the USA, it is compulsory to clear Series 7 and Series 63 exams to be a stockbroker.

In any career in trading, one begins as an intern in any financial organization and then moves up to the level of an assistant trader and then subsequently to the position of a senior trader. It is observed that many experienced traders start their own companies after gaining considerable experience.

Where to Look for a Career in Trading?

Now that you have important information about a career in trading, the next question is where to look for a trading job. You can pursue your career as a trader by working with various organizations like investment banks, asset management companies, hedge funds, and other financial firms. As a trader at an investment or commercial bank, you focus on earning profits by providing liquidity for your clients. Whereas, as a trader working in an asset management company

Buy-Side

Asset Management

You can work as a buy-side analyst at institutions like mutual funds

, private equity, and hedge funds, and asset management organizations. You can also work as a portfolio manager

where you would buy and sell financial tools for your clients. You can also counsel senior traders on whether to buy or sell financial security or not who would perform the task. At buy-side firms, there are restrictions compared to other firms in the role of a trader, as you would mostly follow the orders of a portfolio manager. However, a career in trading at an asset management company can be less demanding and competitive than jobs at other institutions.

Sell-Side

Sell-side usually involves working with institutions like investment banks, asset management companies, and hedge fund companies. A sell-side analyst is the one who prepares an equity research report

to advise whether to buy, sell, or hold the financial tools and thus counsels the clients and investors.

5 Forex Careers for Financial Professionals

The forex markets can be exciting and lucrative for trading if you thoroughly understand how to buy and sell currencies. If you're drawn to this area, you might even want to make it your career.

Forex Markets

Forex markets are open 24 hours a day, five total days a week, which means jobs are fast-paced and involve long days and strange work hours. They require knowledge of and compliance with laws and regulations governing financial accounts and transactions. Some jobs require candidates to have passed one or more exams, such as the Series 3, Series7, Series 34, or Series 63 exams.

If you are eligible to work in a foreign country, a career in forex can bring the added excitement of living abroad. No matter where you work, knowing a foreign language, particularly German, French, Arabic, Russian, Spanish, Korean, Mandarin, Cantonese, Portuguese, or Japanese, is helpful and might be required for some positions.

This article will provide an overview of five major career areas in forex. Please keep in mind that specific positions tend to have different names at different companies.

1. Forex Market Analyst/Currency Researcher/Currency Strategist

A forex market analyst, also called a currency researcher or currency strategist, works for a forex brokerage and performs research and analysis in order to write daily market commentary about the forex market and the economic and political issues that affect currency values.

These professionals use technical, fundamental, and quantitative analysis to inform their opinions and must be able to produce highquality content very quickly to keep up with the fast pace of the forex market. Both individual and institutional traders use this news and analysis to inform their trading decisions.

An analyst might also provide educational seminars and webinars to help clients and potential clients get more comfortable with forex trading. Analysts also try to establish a media presence in order to become a trusted source of forex information and promote their employers. Thus, there is a large marketing component to being a forex analyst.

An analyst should have a bachelor's degree in economics, finance, or a similar area. They may also be expected to have at least one year of experience working in the financial markets as a trader and/or analyst and be an active forex trader. Communication and presentation skills are desirable in any job but are particularly important for an analyst. Analysts should also be well-versed in economics, international finance, and international politics.

2. Forex Account Manager/Professional Trader/Institutional Trader

If you have been consistently successful trading forex on your own, you may have what it takes to become a professional forex trader. Currency mutual funds and hedge funds that deal in forex trading need account managers and professional forex traders to make buy and sell decisions.

Institutional investors such as banks, multinational corporations, and central banks that need to hedge against foreign currency value fluctuations also hire forex traders. Some account managers even manage individual accounts, making trade decisions and executing trades based on their clients' goals and risk tolerance.

It's important to note that these positions have very high stakes. Account managers are responsible for large amounts of money, and their professional reputations and those of their employers are reliant on how well they handle those funds. They are expected to meet profit targets while working with an appropriate level of risk. These jobs may require experience with specific trading platforms, work experience in finance, and a bachelor's degree in finance, economics, or business. Institutional traders may not only need to be effective traders in forex, but also in commodities, options, derivatives, and other financial instruments.

3. Forex Industry Regulator

Regulators attempt to prevent fraud in the forex industry and can hold multiple roles. Regulatory bodies hire many different types of professionals and have a presence in numerous countries. They also operate in both the public and private sectors. The Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC) is the government forex regulator in the U.S., while the National Futures Association (NFA) sets regulation standards, and screens forex dealer members from the private sector.

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The CFTC hires attorneys, auditors, economists, futures trading specialists/investigators, and management professionals. Auditors ensure compliance with CFTC regulations and must have at least a bachelor's degree in accounting, though a master's and Certified Public Accountant (CPA) designation are preferred.

Economists analyze the economic impacts of CFTC rules and must have at least a bachelor's degree in economics. Futures trading specialists/investigators perform oversight and investigate alleged fraud, market manipulation, and trade practice violations, and are subject to work experience and educational requirements that vary by position.

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CFTC jobs are located in Washington, DC, Chicago, Kansas City, and New York and require U.S. citizenship and a background check.

The CFTC also provides consumer education and fraud alerts to the public. Since the CFTC oversees the entire commodity futures and options markets in the U.S., it is necessary to have an understanding of not just forex, but all aspects of these markets. The NFA is similar to the CFTC and also oversees the broader futures and commodities markets, but instead of being a government agency, it is a private-sector self-regulatory organization authorized by Congress.

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Its mission is to maintain market integrity, fight fraud and abuse and resolve disputes through arbitration. It also protects and educates investors and enables them to research brokers (including forex brokers) online. Most NFA jobs are located in New York, but some are in Chicago.

Internationally, a regulator could work for any of the following agencies:

Financial Conduct Authority (FSA) in the U.K.

Financial Services Agency (FSA) in Japan

Securities and Futures Commission (SFC) in Hong Kong

Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) in Australia

4. Forex Exchange Operations, Trade Audit Associate and Exchange Operations Manager

Forex brokerages need individuals to service accounts, and they offer a number of positions that are basically high-level customer service positions requiring FX knowledge. These positions can lead to more advanced forex jobs.

The job of an exchange operations associate includes processing new customer accounts, verifying customer identities as required by federal regulations, processing customer withdrawals, transfers and deposits, and providing customer service. The job usually requires a bachelor's degree in finance, accounting or business, problem-solving and analytical skills, and an understanding of financial markets and instruments, especially forex. It may also require previous brokerage experience.

A related position is a trade audit associate, which involves working with customers to resolve trade-related disputes. Trade audit associates must be good with people, and able to work quickly and think on their feet to solve problems. Unsurprisingly, they must also thoroughly understand forex trading and the company's trading platform in order to help customers.

An exchange operations manager has more experience and greater responsibilities than an exchange operations associate. These professionals execute, fund, settle, and reconcile forex transactions. The job may require familiarity with forex-related software, such as the widely-used Society for Worldwide Interbank Financial Telecommunication (SWIFT) system.

5. Forex Software Developer

Software developers work for brokerages to create proprietary trading platforms that allow users to access currency pricing data, use charting and indicators to analyze potential trades, and trade forex online. Qualifications include a bachelor's in computer science, computer engineering, or a similar degree; operating system knowledge such as UNIX, Linux, and/or Solaris; knowledge of programming languages such as Javascript, Perl, SQL, Python, and/or Ruby; and an understanding in many other technical areas, including back-end frameworks, front-end frameworks, databases, and web servers.

Software developers may not be required to have financial, trading, or forex knowledge to work for a forex brokerage, but knowledge in this area will be a major advantage. If you have forex trading experience, chances are you'll have a much better idea of what customers are looking for in forex software. Software quality is a major differentiator for forex brokerages and a key to the company's success.

For instance, a brokerage faces serious problems if its clients can't execute trades when they want or trades are not executed on time because the software doesn't work properly. A brokerage also needs to attract customers with unique software features and practice trade platforms.

Other positions in forex that require computer-driven experience include user-experience designers, web developers, network and systems administrators, and support technicians.

What Are Some Forex Jobs That Don't Trade?

In addition to the specialized, highly technical careers described above, forex companies need to fill typical human resources and accounting positions. If you're interested in a career in forex, but don't yet have the required background or experience for a technical position, consider getting your feet wet in a general business position and for college undergraduates, many forex companies offer internships.

Is Forex Trading a Good Career?

Forex trading can be a good career if you are able to have realistic expectations when trading and have a system in place that prevents catastrophic losses. There are many careers in forex that are not just for traders, some of which are covered in this article. Such careers offer similar exposure to forex markets but without the risk inherent in forex trading.

The Bottom Line

Having a career in the foreign exchange market doesn't necessarily mean you have to be a trader. Those interested can analyze financials, work for a regulator, or even develop the intricate trading software brokers use. Those who do trade however need to develop not only a financial, but an emotional plan for how they will trade, when they will book gains, and when they will sell at a loss.

Commodity traders take a futures trading position for farm produce such as grains or for commodities such as precious metals mined from the earth.
